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VISION

A world where underserved youth have a second chance to develop employable skills and an opportunity to improve their quality of life by building a rewarding career in technology.



MISSION

Code Youth's mission is to support at-risk and disadvantaged youth between the ages of 17-29 in finding employment solutions, especially youth who have dropped out of high school. We provide entry level coding training and the tools necessary to find meaningful entry level employment in the IT sector.

MONA FORREST

As a longtime foster mother, I was troubled by the lack of opportunities faced by my kids after they left foster care. Over 15 years, not one had escaped the cycle of poverty. Most were among the almost 14% (in 2017) of youth who had not completed high school. When in foster care, youth could receive extra tutoring, be eligible for extra time to complete assignments and tests. They were provided with all the books and materials they needed to assist them to achieve in high school. Even with these supports most young people had been through traumatic events in their lives before foster care. Finishing high school did not rate highly among these kids and they tell me they felt stigmatized by being in foster care.

I gathered friends with expertise in finance and administration and technology – web project management, social media, and communications, and myself with 25 years of non-profit organization management. We brainstormed, including with the young people, to increase their chances of success in life, particularly with their lack of a high school diploma. Code Youth, through summer project grants, hired young people and pursued research to find some answers. Different studies carried out included an environment scan to see what was presently available to help disadvantaged youth with employment opportunities, a feasibility study with budgets, and outreach to youth-serving agencies and corporations in Ottawa. Technology was the answer, particularly website development, and in general entry level work in the rapidly growing Ontario IT sector. Training plans evolved as the summer project teams met with IT employers and developed a training program, with the needs of local employers considered, to maximize our young people's chances of better employment. The training program continues to evolve with more input from employers.

We believe with evolving technology needs and continuing employment opportunities in the sector (in spite of COVID-19), many employers are interested in giving our youth a chance. They do not see the lack of a high school diploma as a particular disadvantage and look at the youth's project presentation and technology abilities. With increased communications about our program, Code Youth will have continued success. Our goals remain to enable young people to have an alternative to low-paying and precarious fast-food jobs, or social assistance, to enter a career with good remuneration, and to enable them to succeed in a better life for themselves.

March 2021 marked the beginning of Code Youth's 3-year funding agreement with Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) under the Youth Employment and Skills Strategy (YESS) program. This new funding allowed us to start delivering our program, free coding training and career strategies, to youth who face barriers to education and/or employment.

We are very grateful to ESDC for this financial support.

This was a year of fast decisions and team collaboration between board members and staff to provide the best possible service to our learners and build the organization's processes from the ground up.

A start-up in the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic required that we establish all of our operations online and develop training in a remote learning environment. This proved to be a positive opportunity as we were able to extend our outreach to youth from right across Ontario, including remote and rural areas. In addition, we had access to hire qualified trainers from anywhere in Canada and gather an amazing staff team of passionate professionals.

Our youth participants come from diverse backgrounds and are challenged with barriers to education and employment. Many have no formal education due to circumstances beyond their control and others have experienced discrimination in the workplace. Yet, these individuals demonstrate flexibility, commitment, and self-discipline throughout the program.

It takes a village and we are very thankful for our volunteers, donors, and supporters! Tech professionals provide our youth with career support, mentorship, and peer programming, as well as goods and services that help them develop their career goals, increase their self-confidence, build their networks, and qualify for entry-level coding positions in Ontario's technology sector. A team of high-school and college students helps with social media, and university students provide ongoing research and administration. Community supporters provide collaborative opportunities to refer our youth to other services that offer additional support. These generous contributions play a key role in the long term financial and economic livelihood of our youth.

I am very proud to be a part of this organization that gives young adults an incredible opportunity to demonstrate their brilliance and resilience and helps them realize their potential and overcome barriers!

Code Youth offers a free 10- to 12-week online training program designed for youth ages 17-29 who are at-risk, have dropped out of high school, or are facing barriers to education and/or employment.

Technical Skills Training to qualify for entry-level coding positions in Ontario's tech sector

- problem-based and led in an AGILE environment to simulate real workplace experience
- team oriented using sprints in Jira and other workplace tools such as Confluence, Slack, GitHub, CodePen, and Sigma
- Portfolio Building to develop and showcase coding projects

Career Preparation Training to prepare for the job market, apply and interview for job postings

- career planning, labour market information, employment search strategies
- resume building, cover letter writing, interview preparation
- employability skills including teamwork, communication, and leadership
- one-one-one coaching for individualized support

One-on-one Coaching to build self-awareness and confidence to explore employment opportunities in application development

- during the training to provide individualized support
- post training support to help them find jobs and build better futures by connecting them to employers

Learning Supports:

- resources such as general office supplies, laptop loaners, domains
- financial support in the form of a paid training allowance

Community Support to understand the tech sector and build confidence

- tech professionals mentor participants to provide career support and tech advice
- tech and other professionals give workshops on industry topics
- employers participate in mock interviews and offer feedback





